

DORIS TERRY, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

## DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. PAGAN:

Q What is your name?

A Doris Terry, 2404 Aliquippa Street.

Q Where do you work?

A I do domestic work.

Q Did you have occasion to be in the Presbyterian Hospital on the morning of September 30?

A Yes, I did. I carried my son to the hospital, and Michael Miller was with us when we went to the hospital.

Q Michael Miller is the gentleman who is now deceased?

A Beg pardon?

Q He's the man who is now dead?

A Yes, he is.

Q What time did you get to the hospital?

A It had to be about 9:30.

Q How long did you remain at the hospital?

A I remained there, I guess, until maybe to about 2:00 or 3:00 o'clock.

Q Now did Michael Miller remain with you at the hospital the entire time?

A He stayed for a while.

Q How long did he stay?

A I guess it had to be about, well, he stayed until about, I guess it was about maybe 10:00.

Q All right. Do you know why he left?

A Yes, I do.

Q Why did he leave?

A Well, a friend, I guess of his, came in and asked him to go out, and the only thing I knew. I don't know what this friend asked him, but I do know that he said to him, "Man, I don't trust you with my money." This boy kept insisting, and then he went on out with this boy.

Q Do you know who this boy is that he left with?

A I really don't know the boy.

Q Could you identify him by looking at him?

A Well, I thought once that I could, but I don't think that I could now, you know.

Q When he left the hospital, did he leave with one or more people?

Hospital?

A Yes.

Q And the younger fellow came back and talked to Michael and persuaded Michael to go with him?

A Yes, he did.

Q Do you know whether or not Michael had any money on him at that time?

A Yes, he did.

Q How do you know that?

A Well, I knew he gave his mother some money.

Q Where did he give his mother the money?

A There in the hospital.

Q Did it look like he had anything left?

A Tell you the truth, I wasn't watching to see how much he had left.

Q At this time, you cannot identify the person he left the hospital with. Is that what you are telling us?

A No, I don't think I can, you know.

BY MR. FAGAN:

Excuse me. Were you still there when Michael came

CROSS EXAMINATION

BY MR. METINKO:

Q Where did all this take place? Where were you during this whole time?

A In Presbyterian Hospital.

Q The emergency room?

A Yes. We were down at the emergency room.

Q And Michael had been with you how long that morning before he left?

A Well, he left the house with me about 9:30.

Q I see. He stayed with you until 10:00 o'clock?

A Yes, he did. I don't know exactly the time, but I know he was with me.

Q Then, a younger boy, as I understand, prevailed upon him to come out with him?

A Yes, he did.

Q They talked for a while?

A I don't know how long they talked. The one with the collar on and this younger boy went out, and then this younger boy came back and he talked to Michael, and I know Michael told him he didn't trust him with his money and he persuaded him to go out. So he

went out with the boy being his friend.

Q That was the last you had seen him?

A That was the last I saw him, until the police brought him back in.

Q Did you know the younger boy at all?

A No, I really didn't.

Q When you say younger, how old would you have estimated him to be?

A He said he was 25.

MR. METINKO: That's all.

REDIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. FAGAN:

Q Mrs. Terry, did you know the relations of any of the men that you saw in the emergency room that day?

A The relations? Well, I tell you what. I didn't know them, but Mrs. Miller told me that he was a grandson of the lady that used to live up on the Hill. But just saying knowing him personally, he was a younger kid and he did tell me that he used to play in an orchestra with a son of mine the same age.

Q Okay, that's all.
